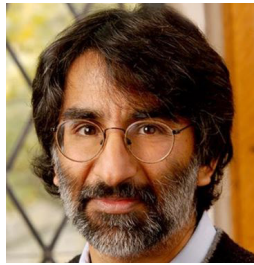


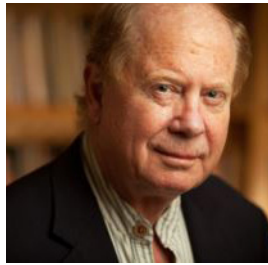

**The Founders Lecture (F or G)** is an annual members-only talk. Begun in 2004, it was sponsored by the Goodhue family, and named for Mary B Goodhue, a New York State legislator and long-time supporter of the Homestead.
